Promote Biodiversity and Use of Native Plants

- ♦ Initiated "Grow IN Natives" certification and continue to support
- Recognize retail outlets that promote sale of native plants; feature them in the <u>Buy Natives</u> <u>Directory</u>
- Assist with incorporating natives in public spaces such as the Eiteljorg Museum and Butler University's Holcomb Gardens
- Rescue native plants from habitat destruction
- Conduct live and virtual native plant auctions

Advocate

- Eliminated nursery sale and distribution of many terrestrial, invasive plant species
- Sponsor invasive plant removal through periodic "Weed Wrangles"

Promote conservation initiatives and encourage legislation that protects the environment

Actively Involve

- Host tours of private gardens and public lands
- Coordinate springtime "Florathon" to raise funds and encourage personal connections with native plants
- Sponsor coach trips to biodiverse regions of special interest
- Initiate garden tours to homes, churches, and businesses that demonstrate the use of native plants in the landscape
- Encourage general public to plan gardens using native plants
- Organize hikes and excursions led by experts to nature preserves, demonstration gardens, and research sites from Lake Michigan to the Ohio River and beyond

Support and Collaborate

- Support scientific research through INPS biodiversity grants
- Sponsor Indiana Native Seed Communities
- Support projects statewide with grants to organizations which purchase and protect land, produce documentaries regarding Indiana's natural heritage, save wooded ravines from invasive species and support research into the biocontrol of garlic mustard
